Seeing Rocks in a New Light

By Dick Shields, Member, OMS and FMS Yes, I will admit that I have the bug – a fascination with fluorescing minerals. As an artist and teacher, I've studied about colors, how the eye sees color, and why objects in natural light appear the way they do. Oranges are orange, wisteria blossoms are lavender, and that mark on the student's test is red because their surfaces absorb all color except the one we see. But change the light source to ultraviolet, and watch what happens!

Luminescent minerals change from dull and drab colors to brilliant blues, oranges, and greens when they are exposed to ultraviolet light. Usually it's due to the presence of an impurity, a metallic "activator" such as manganese. Electrons in the mineral become "excited" by the UV light, then return to a steady state. (Kinda like what happens with me and coffee). The results can be spectacular.

then removed. The phenomenon is called phosphorescence, when electrons become trapped in a high energy state for a moment, then return to steady state. The picture below is an especially brilliant piece of Terlingua calcite that phosphoresces for 20 seconds after I remove the SW lamp (it doesn't phosphoresce at all with LW, and fluoresces pink instead of light blue in LW).

UV bulbs are typically one of three wavelengths, short wave (SW), middle wave (MW), and long wave (LW). Bulbs are available commercially because they have wide spread uses in medical and other industries. There's a good overview of the technical aspects on the web page for MinerShop (listed in our web pages of note).

I have a variety of lamps with combinations of SW and LW (and one MW only) to demonstrate when you come to our house to check out materials from the OMS Library. One caution Bess and I are hard-nosed about: **Some UV wavelengths burn human skin and damage eyes**. Most modern eyeglasses have UV protective coatings and will protect against burning. You can easily test your glasses by holding them between the light and an object that you know fluoresces. It will appear to be in shadow if the glasses are effective.

Field collecting with a UV lamp is a challenge. You have to carry the power source along with the lamp (built-ins are typically weak). In daylight, drape yourself with a dark cover that is big enough to keep out most of the light. I noticed the heat right away when I tried this at Lucy Tunnell's in February. How hot can that get on a summer's day?

Bess and I really enjoyed our night time visit to the Colorado River cobble benches in January – everything seemed to glow, including the scorpions! Just remember, you are sharing the night with other creatures, some of which don't glow under UV (and at night, it's hard to see your footing, even with the lamp on). We are looking forward to visiting Bill Gardner's Purple Passion Mine soon – to collect and to bring you another tale about fluorescents.

Please take a minute to look at the web pages of note. There are some classic examples of fluorescing specimens, including The Thomas S. Warren Museum of Fluorescence in Sterling Hill, New Jersey.
