OMS was the recent recipient of a mineral and fossil collection from Scott DuFrane. Thank you, Scott, for your generous support of our club. The materials will be used in classroom presentations by the Education Committee.

Benitoite

Rick Kennedy will be speaking at our Gem Show about the Benitoite Gem Mine, the significance of this unique gemstone, and will demonstrating how to "etch" mine run rock to free up crystals. Please join us Saturday afternoon at 1:00 pm,

and Sunday at noon in Classroom #1 to hear Rick speak.

Benitoite, the official state gem, is the only mineral that crystallizes in the trigonal bipyramidal form. It is a lovely blue-purple color and is a beautiful and valuable gemstone. Benitoite fluoresces a deep blue color under short wave ultraviolet light.

Rick will bring mine run material which we will view in the Fluorescent Room during the show. Some of the material will be available for sale at the show. We will also have a viewing of Jeanie Lingerfelt's prize pendant necklace with a finished gem Rick discovered in Wes Lingerfelt's rough mine run specimen last year.

One of the highlights of my recent trip to Minnesota was attending the Moose Lake Gem and
Mineral Show. These folks are really into Superior
Agates. A 2-pound (2.5" by 3.5") specimen can go from \$20 to \$600 or more (see samples below).



One of the highlights of the show was the "Agate Stampede." A dump truck full of gravel mixed with 350 pounds of superior agate and \$300 in quarters made a pass down the main street while hundreds of participants looked on. At a signal from the officials, pandemonium reigned. The scene went from A to B in about 2 seconds.

Voyage to Vandenberg

To enter Vandenberg AFB during heightened security, you must have escorts. For our special VAFB odyssey, our escorts were John McCabe from Santa Lucia Rockhounds, and Dick Shields. Visitor Passes were issued at the front gate, and rules of the facility were explained (no collecting above the high tide line, and give the Snowy Plovers the complete right-of-way!).

After satisfying the base officials that we were just a bunch of rockhounds out for a good time, we wound our way up to Lion's Head by entering the Titan Gate, north of the main gate. After spotting abundant wildlife, and benefiting from unusually beautiful weather, we arrived at Minuteman Beach. There was a wildlife attendant ("snowy plover guardian") who explained the rules of the beach, and directed us to collect only to the north. We found satin spar, xonitlite, jaspers, Franciscan chert, agates, and numerous other minerals. Hiking back up the sand dune hill was hard! (especially with full backpacks).

The second stop was on the road, as far north as the road goes. There was a washout years ago, and the road between VAFB and Pt. Sal was never repaired. We looked for swallowtail caterpillars for Ralph's mom, Helen, but there weren't any.

After lunch, we climbed back in the car for the trip to main base, and "Slick 2" (Space Launch Complex 2). Broken abalone shells and chiton plates were everywhere! Tidepools, sheer cliffs, an abundance of tumbled agates and jaspers... there was something for everyone on this beach. Why don't you come along next time we have the opportunity to explore this wild, remote central California treasure?



OMS Purpose

Founded in 1958, and is named after William Orcutt, a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a district manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, Orcutt discovered the fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits, one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history. The Society is a non-profit club, dedicated to stimulating an interest in rocks and minerals. The club offers educational programs, field trips, youth activities, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in collecting and lapidary treatment of rocks, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of Earth Sciences. In addition, a goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the society's endeavors. Operating rules have been set forth to guide the Officers and members of the Society in

accomplishing these purposes. Affiliations: California Federation of Mineralogical Societies and American Federation of Mineralogical Societies.
