OMS Finds Gold at Mermaid Event

The dust has settled from the 28th annual California Federation of Mineral Societies (CFMS) Show that was held this year at the Ventura Fairgrounds. This year, the show had the added bonus of being the annual American Federation of Mineral Societies (AFMS) Show, a coincidence that happens once in 7 years, as the AFMS show rotates among the 7 federations that make it up. The theme of the show this year was "mermaids."

Orcutt Mineral Society did quite well at this show. Paul Patrick won the CFMS Trophy for his gem trees, and missed the AFMS trophy on a technicality. Wayne Mills won AFMS and CFMS Trophies for his Chumash Soapstone Artifact Reproductions, and won a Best in Class ribbon as well. Don Nasholm exhibited some of his exquisite silverwork, and Dick and Bess Shields exhibited and volunteered a lot of time at the fluorescent exhibit. Ted and Marjorie Hoogenbosch volunteered a lot of their time to help out at the show. (Soon they are off on another fairytale rock trip that includes a swing up to Washington, then a voyage across the northern US in their purple palace on wheels.)

The Del Air Rockhounds Club of San Fernando Valley did a great job of hosting the event, and while I bet that several of their members will take a week or so to recover, their energy carried them through the weekend in fine style. There were some great displays, awesome dealers, and very talented demonstrators, as well as the best plant sale I have seen at one of these shows. All the folks from Del Air whom I met were congenial and helpful, in spite of the tremendous pressure they must have felt. Way to go to the max you all.

Other highlights of the show in my mind:

- The farewell appearance of Larry Bidwell from the Glendora School District. Larry is an old acquaintance who has done an amazing job with students from one of the Junior High Schools in the district for at least the last 25 years. He has taught a unique combination of lapidary and earth sciences to his students including field trips, and entry into gem and mineral shows. His students recently honored him with a party to celebrate his entry into the next phase of his career.
- Dr. Marcus Erickson's talk on "Digging for Dinosaurs". We learned that 85% of the dinosaur fossils from Wyoming where he has his "Excavacations" are triceratops-the cows of the Cretaceous. I was also stunned to hear that some dinosaurs <u>did</u> survive the end of the Cretaceous extinctions in India, and in Peru. Dr. Erickson's full sized Tricera-

tops that he and his crew built from bones and an old oil tank in 3 months was pretty impressive too.

- Jim and Nancy Brace Thompsons cases of fossils were to die for-well, a lot of fossils did! David Mauntz's three cases of trilobites was very impressive too! (If you detect a certain prejudice towards fossils, well, you're pretty observant!)
- Steve Ivie's case of cabachons of Horse Canyon material was very well done, and a great example of how effective one-location cases can be.
- **Dick Fresien's freeform lapidary**. Dick also demonstrated his art at the show. His great stone selection, the organic design of his castings, and his ability to free-form hard stone, were very impressive and pleasing to the eye.
- Several of the mineral cases were exquisite. There must have been thousands of dollars of minerals represented here, and all were quite well displayed. It would be very hard to judge among some of these displays. Amazing what people can do with the old silver pick if they are properly focused on their desired outcome.

There was a mineral in the fluorescent case called Andersonite with a lovely, bright greenish-white fluorescence, and a cab in the CFMS case (Double Spring Agate-Valley Springs, CA) that I hadn't noticed before. Both of these materials were quite appealing, as were many of the deals offered by both inside and outside dealers. One guy from down south had a lot of turquoise beads from China. A 10-inch strand of uniform, rounded beads, like I hope to make from the material I collected at the Bluebird mine in Nevada, ran \$12.00! I'm going to have a hard time making 5 beads for that price!

Well, I could go on, but I hope this is enough to encourage the readers of this article to venture to the next CFMS Show to be held in Mariposa on May 28-30, 2004.



OMS members had a unique opportunity this month to visit two different collection sites in the area northeast of San Miguel. The riverbeds were in close proximity but each contained minerals distinct to its source.

The first trip was to Salty's Ranch at Big Sandy on June 14th. We were joined by the Santa Lucia rockhounds, and really enjoyed their company. The local tall-tales, identification of minerals we found along the riverbed, and history snippets about the San Miguel area were great!

We came away with some wonderful fossil turitella in hard matrix, massive pieces of jasper (including an orbicular, Morgan Hill type poppy jasper), multi-colored chert, onyx, and much more. There were artifacts to admire, and concretions in the steep banks behind Salty's home. This was a highly successful day of friendship, swapping, and snacking.

The club offers educational programs, field trips, youth activities, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in collecting and lapidary treatment of rocks, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of Earth Sciences. In addition, a goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the society's endeavors. What is "Rose Gold"?

Debbie Hood and I were comparing notes about the May 2003 CFMS article on "Gold". One item that just didn't make sense to us was the statement, "Please note that Rose Gold has no actual gold in it."

Rose gold is made by adding more copper, and less silver to the gold. Copper, nickel or zinc is used in the gold alloy to accomplish the various hues of red, rose, and pink gold.
