

March Birthstones

There are two birthstones for March: Aquamarine and Bloodstone.

Aquamarine's name comes from the Latin for seawater, and ancient mariners claimed the gem would calm waves and keep sailors safe at sea. This March birthstone was also thought to bring happiness in marriage. Beryl was believed to give the wearer protection against foes in battle and litigation. It was also thought to make the wearer unconquerable and amiable, and to quicken the intellect.

Bloodstone, also known as heliotrope, is a variety of chalcedony (cryptocrystalline quartz) that is traditionally semitranslucent to opaque dark green jasper with red inclusions of iron oxides, especially hematite. Bloodstone's alternate name *heliotrope* comes from the ancient Greek word that means "to turn the sun." In ancient times, these March birthstones were believed to turn the sun red if they were placed in water. The name *bloodstone* derives from the belief by some that the color pattern has religious significance, representing the blood of Christ.

Aquamarine transparent or opaque

Aquamarine is best known as a highly transparent blue stone. High-clarity, fracture-free aquamarine is abundant and more affordable. High-clarity, fracture-free stones are also more attractive and less likely to be damaged during wear.

Did you know that nice pieces of translucent aquamarine are also used in jewelry? Translucent aquamarine is often cut into beads and sometimes cut as <u>cabochons</u>. Necklaces strung with beads of pastel blue aquamarine and pastel pink <u>morganite</u> (both color-varieties of the mineral beryl) make a beautiful combination.

Fancy Jasper

It is unusual to find green chalcedony with markings that are only red in color. Usually there are dots, bands, or

streaks of white, yellow, orange, and brown. If these other colors are less abundant than the red markings, the material is still called bloodstone by many people.

When colors other than red dominate, either alone or as a group, the material is usually called "fancy jasper." The name "jasper" is used because opaque chalcedony is, by definition, a jasper. Bloodstone is not called "jasper" because the name "bloodstone" is more specific.

42,000-Year-Old Trees Enable Accurate Analysis of Earth's Last Magnetic Field Reversal

The last complete reversal of the Earth's magnetic field, the so-called Laschamps event, took place 42,000 years ago. Radiocarbon analyses of the remains of kauri trees from New Zealand now make it possible for the first time to precisely time and analyze this event and its associated effects, as well as to calibrate geological archives such as sediment and ice cores from this period.

Covid 19 News

I promised to provide some Covid Vaccination information, but failed to do so last month.

County Vaccinations

SLO county has three vaccination sites:

- Cuesta College (Performing Arts Center)
- Paso Robles at PR Event Center

• Arroyo Grande High School (Clark Center) SLO county also has several private providers that you can get appointments with including Vons/ Albertsons, Ralphs, Cayucos Pharmacy, CVS Arroyo Grande, and Rite Aid Arroyo Grande. (Jeanne and I got our appointments through CVS Arroyo Grande.)

You can go to <u>Vaccine Registration - San Luis Obispo Coun-</u><u>ty (recoverslo.org)</u>. There is a block for first dose appointments and a block for second dose appointments. I haven't seen it say that 1st dose appointments are available. I have seen 2nd dose appointments available. It should update based on whether appointments are available. I have heard that Thursday Morning at 9:00am is the best time, but you should probably check every morning at around 9:00.

There is a gray block below the county reservation. If you click that it will take you to the private providers (such as CVS Arroyo Grande). You should check all of them for available appointments. You can call (805)543-2444 or (805)781-4280 if you don't have computer availability or if you need help.

Santa Barbara County

As far as I can determine, they don't have vaccinations given by the county. All providers are private pharmacies or health providers.

Go to <u>Vaccine Appointments 65+ – County of Santa Barbara</u> (<u>publichealthsbc.org</u>) for a full list of vaccination locations. Hopefully you can find one that has appointments available. Marion Medical Centre is one of the locations in Santa Maria. You can probably call them at (805)739-3000 If you can't use a computer for getting an appointment.

New Business- We previously agreed to carry dues over from last year.



PINTEREST—Geology Page





The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
