Terminology - Sulfides

Sulfides are a class of minerals that contain the element Sulfur. There are a great many mineral compounds that contain Sulfur and a metal such as lead or iron. Sulfides are one of the most important of chemical compounds in the mineral world and many are easily identified by beginning rockhounds. Pyrite (iron sulfide), galena (lead sulfide), and cinnabar (mercury sulfide) are all common minerals.


Sulfide minerals generally have a metallic luster to them which makes them sparkle. They can also have very unique and symmetrical crystal structures as well as bright colors. Pyrite is famous for its cubic shape while cinnabar is famous for its beautiful red color.

All About Cinnabar

Cinnabar is the most abundant ore of for mining elemental mercury. It is usually red in color, but can be many shades from scarlet red to brown to a dull grey. It has a hardness of 2 to 2.5 and a density of 8.1 which makes it one of the heaviest minerals on earth. It also has one of the highest refractive indices of any mineral.

Cinnabar has a very interesting history. It has been used as a pigment in paint, cloth dyes, Chinese lacquer, and makeup. It is sometimes know by its other name, vermillion. Although they are the same chemical compound, cinnabar refers to the mineral while vermillion refers to the pigment. It has been used by the Romans and the Greeks for thousands of years as well as by neolithic cultures around the world. Practically any society that lived near a volcano would have had access to and would have used cinnabar in their culture. The red color is captivating, but the mercury containing cinnabar is also highly toxic. It was slowly phased out of use as a pigment once mercury poisoning was associated with it.

Elemental Mercury made from cinnabar had a commercial use in gold and silver refining starting as early as 1558 and was widely used for this purpose up until the 1960s when it finally came to an end due to health and environmental concerns. Mercury as a product is now limited to thermometers, barometers, mercury vapor lights and some electrical components. However, those products are slowly being removed as well. Old school "black lights" were made with mercury vapor and you may have seen your mineral collections fluoresce under its UV light.

If you have specimens of cinnabar, know that they are relatively safe. The mercury is bound to sulfur in the mineral form. However, take precautions to limit your exposure. Do not breathe the dust when cutting or polishing the mineral. Also be sure to wash your hands after handling it.

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ADDRESS CORRECTION REQUESTED

The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth

to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
