Spring in the Air

Spring on the Central California Coast this year is unfolding as seasonally pleasant, with an abundant display of wildflowers. We've experience several episodes of rain showers between warm spells, prolonging the green season. The warmth has made our field trips to Figueroa Mountain and to Santa Agueda Creek especially enjoyable.

Our upcoming trip will be to La Brea Creek, a tributary of the Sisquoc River, located about 30 miles east of Santa Maria. We explored the area last year in May, and found an abundance of wildflowers and wildlife (Remember the ticks from last year's bulletin? Bess does!), as well as butterflies. The creek is filled with large boulders suitable for landscaping and abundant cobbles. Some cobbles, we found, do fluoresce! The creek cuts through Monterey Shale and ancient streambeds filled with a mixture of

materials, including the ever popular "Monkey Turds", colorful cobbles in a brown matrix. At the far reach of our trip we see into the Cuyama basin from the crest of Miranda Pine Mountain escarpment.

We will be on the northern edge of the San Rafael Wilderness area and will have vistas into rarely traveled canyons and mountain ranges. The entire trip from Colson Canyon to the Miranda Pines area will be 33 miles of unimproved roads (our favorite kind). For nearly 8 miles the road forms the northern boundary the boundary of the wilderness.

Sometimes it gets a bit confusing trying to tell the difference between a Wilderness Area, National Forest, and State Park. Because Dick is planning a club trip to the edge of the Los Padres/San Rafael Wilderness area, he must be certain that we have all of the facts before setting out on our trek. Where can we pick up a

few rocks without being arrested? What is the condition of roads? Are there campgrounds and latrines, or places for us to picnic? Preparation is obviously the key.

It's the duty of a Field Trip Chairman to check these things out before we hit the road, and to (hopefully) prepare adequately for the journey. So, this month I watched as Dick planned this club adventure. He made numerous phone calls, downloaded maps, and consulted with people who had made similar trips to the area in the past.

A little natural history lesson on the wilderness area will help us appreciate this beautiful spot in our own backyard:

"After the initial preservation of land under the Wilderness Act of 1964, the original San Rafael Wilderness (1968) was the first Primitive area added to the NWPS's roster. Here in the chaparral-covered San Rafael Mountains, elevations range from 1,166 feet near the confluence of Manzana Creek and the Sisquoc River in the west to over 6,800 feet on Big Pine Mountain near the eastern boundary and Dick Smith Wilderness. Too rocky and shallow to entice river runners, except perhaps in spring high water, all but two of the Sisquoc's 33 Wild and Scenic miles are within the Wilderness, tumbling through pools and oak-shaded grasslands, over waterfalls and past archaeological sites. The region known as Hurricane Deck stretches for 17 miles of steep escarpments, grassy potreros, dry plateaus, and wind-carved sandstone formations. Wildflowers are abundant March through June. The Wilderness contains the Sisquoc Condor Sanctuary, and black bears and mountain lions also live here with numerous smaller animals. San Rafael Wilderness has over 125 relatively rugged miles of trails that receive moderate human use. A path follows the Sisquoc River east-west for about 26 miles, and campsites abound. Large portions of the Wilderness are closed during fire season (July through mid-November) because of extreme fire danger."

We will be traveling on National Forest roadways, but can see the rugged and beautiful San Rafael Wilderness from the comfort of our cars.

Reprinted from CFMS Newsletter, May 2003 by Chuck McKie, CFMS Safety Chairman Going on vacation? Play it Safe! This is the time of year many of us head off for a wonderful vacation. Following are some tips to have a happy home coming:

Crime Prevention Tips - You are going on vacation, help burglars take one too! An empty house is a tempting target for a burglar. Use this checklist of tips to help safeguard your home while you're away.

CHECKLIST:

- Have good locks on all doors and windows and USE THEM.
- Ask a neighbor to watch the house while you're away. It's a good idea to leave your vacation address and telephone number with a neighbor so you can be reached in an emergency.
- Never leave your house key hidden outside your home.
- Stop all deliveries, or arrange for a neighbor to pick up your mail, newspapers and packages.
- Arrange for someone to mow your lawn, rake leaves and maintain the yard to give the home a lived-in look.
- Plug in timers to turn lights, a radio or television on and off at appropriate times. This
 helps disguise the fact that you are away.
- Turn the bell or ringer on your telephone down low. If a burglar is around, he won't be alerted to your absence by a ringing phone.
- Don't announce your absence on answering machine messages.
- Leave the blinds, shades and curtains in a normal position. Don't close them unless that's what you do when you're home.
- Close and lock garage doors and windows. Ask a neighbor to occasionally park in your driveway. If you leave your car at home, park it as you normally would. Vehicles parked outside should be moved occasionally to show they are being used.
- Secure storage sheds, attic entrances and gates.
- Tell your local police you plan to be away.
 Patrol officers may have the opportunity to periodically check your home.

 Engrave your valuables as recommended in Operation I. D. This simple step will allow your stolen property to be identified and returned to you if recovered by the police.

READY TO TRAVEL!

- If you are driving, make sure your vehicle has been properly serviced and is in suitable condition for the journey.
- Try to have specific directions and routes to your destination.
- If you get lost, call the police for directions or assistance.
- Always keep your vehicle doors and windows locked.
- At stop lights and other traffic delays, leave enough space in front of your vehicle so that you have an escape option in case of an emergency.
- Let someone know the route you intend to travel and your itinerary. This will help authorities in locating you if there is a need to do so.
- Plan your trip carefully and allow for such factors as weather, fatigue, facilities for lodging, food and fuel. Be sure you have sufficient finances- either cash, traveler's checks or credit cards.
- Ask the hotel or motel staff about their security measures so you know what to expect.
- Use the hotel safe to store your valuables during your stay.

Staying alert to safety may make your vacation much more pleasant and enjoyable. Being a victim of a crime is no fun. Relax, have fun, and be safe!
